ABOUT HERTFORD STREET

ertford Street is located in Mayfair, one of the most exclusive areas of London. Mavfair earned its name from the May Fair which was originally established in the 1600s to raise funds for the Hospital of St. James but continued until 1764 when the area became gentrified.

Mayfair was developed on fields belonging to the eminent Curzon family. During the mideighteenth century there became an increasing demand for London homes for the gentry to use during the months when parliament sat and the Royal Family were in residence.

Hertford Street was built on Brick Hill Field between 1764-1771 by Henry Holland the elder, his son and John Eldridge. Robert Adam designed the interiors, most notably





at 10 Hertford Street. The houses are typically Georgian with panelled doors, fanlights, cornicing and interior panels. Space was reserved for stabling for each property. The area retained a rural feel with a large duck pond nearby and a ruling that the green space off the neighbouring Down Street have no railings.

By the 1920s, 9 Hertford Street had been converted into apartments.

Hertford Street is named after the nearby Hertford Arms public house, which closed in the 1880s

THE STORY OF HEYWOOD HILL

Located just the other side of Shepherd Market is the notable bookshop, Heywood Hill. Founded by George Heywood Hill in 1936, its range includes rare, notable and scholarly books which were beloved by its owner. His devotion to the business extended to his bed being located in the corner of the shop floor which was curtained off during the day. In the 1940s, author and socialite Nancy Mitford was employed there; her influence saw the development of a range of novels, and her energy and enthusiasm attracted notable customers including Evelyn Waugh and Cecil Beaton. During her tenure she wrote her most famous novel, The Pursuit of Love. The exceptional personal service provided by the founding staff continues to this

day; the shop offers a fabulous, tailored subscription package (inspired by a one-to-one reading consultation with you), and if you're in for a browse and would like some guidance, a member of the team will be only too happy to assist you.

HIDDEN

Dennis Severs' House Folgate Street

Purchased as a renovation project in 1979, Severs restored the house to how it would've looked and been utilised in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. It has been described by Hockney as "one of the world's top five experiences".

Hampstead Pergola & Hill Gardens Inverforth Close

Hampstead Pergola was built in 1904 as a place for Lord Leverhulme to enjoy the far-reaching views of his estate and to host extravagant garden parties. Over time, he bought more and more land to extend the landscaped gardens.

Leighton House Holland Park Road

The home and studio of Victorian artist Frederic. Lord Leighton is lauded for its beautiful Orientalist and aesthetic interiors. Of particular note is the Arab Hall which was inspired by Leighton's travels to Palermo, Granada, Istanbul, Cairo and Damascus.

Neasden Temple Pramukh Swami Road

Neasden Temple, Britain's first authentic Hindu temple, was completed in 1995. Constructed using traditional methods and materials, it features over 26,000 carved stone pieces. This breathtaking feat of architecture was commended by Time Out as one of the "Seven Wonders of London".

Sir John Soane's Museum Lincoln's Inn Fields

Opening as a museum upon the death of architect Soane in 1837, it's still very much as it was when he lived there. On display are his vast collection of antiquities, paintings, drawings, sculptures and architectural models.

Strawberry Hill House Waldegrave Road

Originally called Chopped Straw Hall, the seventeenth century cottage was bought by Horace Walpole in 1748 with a vision of transforming it into a "little Gothic castle". It took several years to complete but became the first example of Gothic Revival architecture.

Bath (in the West of England), with its beautiful Georgian architecture and thermal springs, became a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1987 and a Great Spa Town of Europe in 2021. Attractions include the Roman Baths, Royal Crescent, The Jane Austen Centre, Bridgerton filming locations and Sally Lunn's historic eating house.


Brighton (1.25 hours by train)

Brighton is a picturesque seaside town set on the south coast. Its most famous building is the magnificent Royal Pavilion, built in 1787 for King George IV. Other attractions include the vintage shops along The Lanes, Devil's Dyke, the Toy and Model Museum, Volk's Electric Railway and of course, the beach!

Cambridge (1.5 hours by train)

The historic university town of Cambridge is set in the East of England. Attractions include King's College Chapel, the Scott Polar Research Institute,

the Fitzwilliam Museum, Kettle's Yard art gallery, the historic Eagle public house and punting on the Cam.

Cardiff (2.5 hours by train)

Cardiff, the capital city of Wales, is set in Glamorgan in the south of the country. Attractions include Cardiff Castle, Llandaff Cathedral, Cardiff Bay and Flat Holm Island.

Oxford (1.25 hours by train)

The beautiful town of Oxford is home to one of the world's most important research universities. Attractions include the fascinating Ashmolean Museum, the University Museum of Natural History, the Museum of the History of Science and punting along the Cherwell.

The New Forest (2 hours by train)

Perfect for a day exploring the countryside, The New Forest on the south coast is a great place to see a range of flora and fauna, and of course the wild New Forest ponies.

York (2 hours by train)

This walled city has a fascinating history, dating from Roman times and with a Viking past, too. Highlights include the Gothic cathedral York Minster, the National Railway Museum (home to the world's fastest steam locomotive. The Mallard). The Shambles medieval cobbled street and Betty's Tea Rooms.

TAILS of the City

here are some lovely green spaces around Hertford Street including **Hyde Park** and **Green Park**, who welcome dogs on leads. Hyde Park's Serpentine Lido Café and Magazine Restaurant are dog-friendly which is just perfect for a welcome refreshment break whilst exploring the area.

Many of our local cafés and pubs welcome dogs, including the King's Arms, Shepherd Market Wine House, Chesterfield Arms, Ye Grapes (outside only) and Queens of Mayfair.

If you're looking for an outside activity to share with your dog, we highly recommend the walk or **GoBoat** ride along the beautiful Regent's Canal.

One of London's major attractions, Tower Bridge, offers the dog-friendly experience of traversing along the glass walkway, where you get the most incredible views of the capital.

The fascinating **Brunel Museum**, which charts the history of the Thames Tunnel, welcomes dogs. Situated on the south of the river in leafy Rotherhithe, it can be reached by **Uber Boat**.

A novel evening out with your pet is a dog-friendly cinema screening. Picturehouse cinemas regularly hold these so it's worth checking the listings on their website.

We absolutely adore **Big City Dog** which is London's first dog concept store. Situated beside Holland Park in Kensington, it offers dog grooming, has a dog boutique for essentials and luxuries and a café where you and your pooch can relax and enjoy a treat together.





Well-behaved dogs and their friendly owners are welcome at select films on Sunday mornings at Picturehouse cinemas. With snacks and water at the ready and blanketed seats as to avoid any stray hairs, this is a great way for dog owners to enjoy cinema.
